## EDITORIAL

We bring out the fifth issue of *Buceros* as a tribute to the golden jubilee of India's independence. This issue discusses the problems of common English bird name changes for the Indian subcontinent in a very detailed manner. The same subject, readers may recollect, was dealt with briefly and in a more popular vein, in an earlier issue of *Buceros* (Vol. 2, No. 1). Then, we had just begun to scrape at the surface of the problem and now after much more work, we have realised the complexity of the task and have even had to retract some of our earlier statements.

Thus, this treatise is much more 'matured', but we still anticipate criticism and non-acceptance of some of our views. However, we welcome such responses, as it is hoped that through such an exercise a consensus on the common names of birds of the Indian subcontinent could be arrived at. Thereafter, the finalised list will be sent to the International Ornithological Congress committee, which is in the process of preparing a standardised list of English common bird names of the world.

Due to the large size of the tables, we had to forego the format and size of our earlier issues of *Buceros*. This will also be the case with our March (Vol. 3, No.1) issue, which will provide in a tabular form the different Indian vernacular names of birds of the Indian subcontinent. This issue too will be dedicated to fifty years of India's independence. Lastly, we wish to thank the following persons for their comments on earlier drafts of the manuscript: Dr. Pamela Rasmussen (Smithsonian Institution), Dr. Saraswati Unnithan (BNHS), Rishad Naoroji (BNHS), V. ## COMMON NAME CHANGES OF THE BIRDS OF THE INDIAN SUBCONTINENT

### INTRODUCTION

People do not readily accept name changes in any sphere of life and find it especially difficult if it has occurred on a large scale. Drastic and large-scale changes in the English common names are being implemented in the field of ornithology and many ornithologists and bird watchers are agitated over this issue. The idea to have the same English common names for all the birds all over the world would be a good idea, and is not a daunting task since it concerns less than 10,600 species, unlike the multitude of plants or insects that swamp the world. The International Ornithological Congress (IOC) has commissioned the preparation of a standardized text of English names for birds of the world. Standardization of common names would especially be welcomed by the legion of amateur birdwatchers, governmental and non-governmental organisations and personnel who deal with birds, but do not have the time or inclination to learn scientific names. However, there is dissent from many, who see no valid reasons for such a change, citing the antiquity of the existing names for adhering on to the same names and arguing that uniformity is anyway guaranteed via scientific names. Even ornithologists who welcome the idea of the standardization of common names, are dismayed at some of the changes and the 'dictatorial' manner in which even the endemic birds of their own country have been renamed by 'outsiders'.

Most, if not all, of the common English names presently being used for Indian birds were given by the British, as they were the pioneers in the systematic study of birds in the Indian subcontinent. Very few name changes occurred in India after the publication of Salim Ali and Dillon Ripley's **Handbook** and also the latter's **Synopsis** during the 1960s and 1970s, both of which are regarded as the Bible for Indian ornithologists and birdwatchers. Prior to these, the major bird books of the Indian subcontinent were by Jerdon (1862-64), Oates and Blanford (1888-98) and Baker (1922-30), and some changes in common names were made, especially by Baker, who was the first to adopt the trinomial system for Indian birds.

The recent imbroglio regarding common names (and scientific names) arose after the publication of Sibley and Monroe's books (1990, 1993), wherein they had made major changes in the classification of birds based on the DNA structure. Their work has turned the presently followed classification topsy-turvy, and now the Megapodiidae are at the top of the classification order instead of the Gaviidae for the birds recorded in the Indian subcontinent (note: there is disagreement or criticism on certain aspects of the work of Sibley & Monroe - see **Auk** 106: 508-512, **Ibis** 134: 204-206). Another major controversy was raked up by the same authors in that they also changed the common names for many bird species, which has found favour with the IOC in its search for an agreement on the standardisation of English common names.

Here, we look into some of the name changes of birds of the Indian subcontinent, and have proposed names that should apply to birds of our region. We seek not to add to the controversy, but hope to initiate a debate, so that the most appropriate name gets selected for each species. It is contemplated that with the help of this publication, which will be made available to eminent ornithologists of the Indian subcontinent, a decision on the common bird names for the Indian subcontinent can be agreed upon. This could be via the feedback we receive or a meeting of these ornithologists (if it could take place). Further to this, the finalised list could be sent to the IOC for implementation or finalisation.

### DISCUSSION

The purpose of standardising the common names of birds all over the world appears to be:

#### 1) *That there would be no overlap of names.*

*Example:* The Mountain Quail in India refers to *Ophrysia superciliosa*, while in U.S.A it denotes *Oreortyx picta* (which is also known as the Plumed Quail). The former has now been renamed Himalayan Quail.

**2) Necessitated when a species/subspecies has been split/demoted/upgraded to species/subspecies levels, or when placed in another family/order, after reassessment of its taxonomic status.**

Example: The race *japonica* of *Coturnix coturnix* (Common Quail) is now treated as a species, with the name Japanese Quail *C. japonica*. In such cases, there can be no dispute regarding the necessity for name changes, and such changes have been taking place with regularity in bird taxonomy, as and when it was necessary.

**3) To rectify wrong, inappropriate names or shorten lengthy names.**

Examples:

A) Correcting wrong or inaccurate descriptive or regional names of a species. For example, giving the name of 'redheaded' to a species when only top of the head is red. In such cases, the names have been changed to redcapped or redcrowned. Or where the earlier known distributional range recorded for a species is no more true - e.g., a species recorded earlier in the Western Ghats was later on recorded also from the Eastern Ghats. Many such examples are discussed further on in this paper.

b) Shortening long names such as Fulvousbreasted Pied Woodpecker (*Dendrocopus macei*) to Fulvous-breasted Woodpecker and Lord Derby's Parakeet (*Psittacula derbiana*) to Derby's Parakeet.

**4) To ensure that the common name is applicable to all the races of a species**

Example: The White-rumped Magpie *Pica pica* has a black-rumped race (*P. c. bottanensis*) and hence the name is inappropriate. The new name proposed is the Black-billed Magpie.

**Some name changes through the years**

Many of the names for Indian birds have been in use for more than a century (see Table 1). Thus, unless really justified on valid grounds, name changes should be avoided for reasons of antiquity alone. Quite a few names have undergone changes through the years, some of which are cited below:

- \* The Painted Stork *Mycteria leucocephala* was known as the Pelican Ibis during Jerdon's time.
- \* The Indian Pied Hornbill *Anthracoceros albirostris* had two names (Bengal Pied Hornbill and Dehra Doon Hornbill) during Jerdon's time, as both these races were considered to be different species then.
- \* Earlier, the brown backed subspecies of the Indian Robin *Saxicola fulicata* was considered as a different species, and was called the Brown-backed Indian Robin.
- \* Chloropses or leaf birds were known as bulbuls during Jerdon's time.
- \* Ioras were known as Green Bulbuls. The Common Iora *Aegithina tiphia* was known as the White-winged Green Bulbul, the Marshall's Iora *A. nigrolutea* as Black-headed Green Bulbul.
- \* The 'shanks' of the sandpiper family were known by plural names, i.e., Redshanks and Greenshanks, since a pair, and not only one of the 'legs', was red or green in colour!
- \* The Comb Duck *Sarkidiornis melanotos* was known as the Blackbacked Goose.
- \* Sunbirds were known as Honey-suckers.
- \* The Jerdon's Courser *Rhinoptilus bitorquatus* was christened Doublebanded Plover by Jerdon. Baker called it the Jerdon's Courser, and Ali & Ripley used two names for the species - Jerdon's or Doublebanded Courser in the **Handbook**.
- \* Name changes had even occurred from Ripley's **Synopsis** to Ali & Ripley's **Handbook**, for example *Merops orientalis* was known in Ripley's **Synopsis** as Green Bee-eater, but became Small Green Bee-eater in Ali & Ripley's **Handbook**. Both Jerdon and Baker called it the Common Indian Bee-eater.

**Some examples of warranted name changes**

---

On perusal of the new name changes (Table 1), we find some of the examples discussed below to be good, necessary or valid cases of bird name changes.

- \* Cases where the group/family name has been added to a name, which did not earlier have the tag of the family name. Examples are Coppersmith (*Megalaima haemacephala*) to Coppersmith Barbet, Rubycheek (*Anthreptes singalensis*) to Rubycheeked Sunbird and Houbara (*Chlamydotis undulata*) to Houbara Bustard. Such changes are especially useful to bird watchers in a foreign country to easily know what type of bird is being referred to - e.g. Coppersmith and Coppersmith Barbet. Such name changes are also beneficial in the case of simple bibliographic databases - unless one goes by scientific names or codes.

However, exceptions may have to be allowed for species well known by 'single' names and especially if there is only one species of its kind (e.g. Ostrich, Osprey, Kiwi, Emu, Secretary Bird). It should be avoided where many species occur for a genus/group (e.g. ducks, buzzards, green pigeons), though this can be a difficult task in certain cases and may not be welcomed by many, for example a change from Mallard to Mallard Duck.

- \* Where descriptive names have been added to bird species which were earlier known only by their family or group names, e.g. Bittern *Botaurus stellaris* to Great Bittern, Buzzard *Buteo buteo* to Common Buzzard and Green Pigeon *Treron phoenicoptera* to Yellow-fronted Green-Pigeon.

Deletion of alternate common names for species is a positive step. Ornithologists often wondered which name to use, if they did not wish to use both names while writing a paper or article. In such cases, the more fitting name should be selected. In the case of Yellowbilled Chough or the Alpine Chough *Pyrhcorax graculus*, the former name should be retained, since there is a very similar species with the name Redbilled Chough *P. pyrhorcorax*. We advocate the use of descriptive names on the same part of the body - if differently coloured - in similar looking species, e.g., Red-billed and Yellow-billed, not Red-billed and Yellow-backed. Other examples of deletion of alternate names are Ruddy Shelduck/Brahminy Duck *Tadorna ferruginea* to Ruddy Shelduck, Emerald Dove/Bronze-winged Dove *Chalcophaps indica* to Emerald Dove and Black-breasted Quail/Rain Quail *Coturnix coromandelica* to Rain Quail.

- \* Name changes necessitated when taxonomic or other studies showed that some species do not belong to the families/groups earlier assigned to them. For example, the Fantail-Flycatchers (*Rhipidura*), earlier thought to belong to the Muscicapidae group, have been shifted to Corvidae and the suffix Flycatcher removed from the common name (the group is now known as Fantail).

### Some examples of unwarranted name changes

Some name changes appear to be totally unwarranted, as cited below:

- \* A classic example of 'insensitivity to the locals' is the renaming of the Great Indian Bustard *Ardeotis nigriceps*, which existed only in the Indian subcontinent (and is presently recorded only in India), to the Indian Bustard. For those who have worked on or seen the species, removal of the adjective Great from the species would be a gross affront to the bird. In addition, the species has been cited quite frequently in India by its former name in a number of newspapers, popular articles, scientific journals, books and pamphlets, and thus such an arbitrary name change is unwarranted.
- \* In some cases, renaming or shortening of names have taken off the 'substance' in some of the names. For example, the Indian Great Black Woodpecker *Dryocopus javensis* of the mainland (now both the mainland and the Andaman races are treated as separate species), a species almost wholly black except for a red crest and a white belly, has been renamed as White-bellied Woodpecker. It could be named as White-bellied Black Woodpecker. Similarly, the tag of Longtailed, added to the species of wrens that have long tails (wrens generally have a short stumpy tail) has been deleted, which cuts out information on this special character of these species.
- \* For reasons mentioned above under the earlier sub-heading, the removal of family names from species (e.g., Besra Sparrowhawk *Accipiter virgatus* to Besra, Openbilled Stork *Ciconia episcopus* to Asian Openbill, Broadbilled Roller *Eurystomus orientalis* to Dollarbird and Chukar Partridge *Alectoris chukar* to Chukar) are wrong steps in the renaming of birds. The Broadbilled Roller may have been given the name Dollarbird (which is its alternate name in its distributional range over Asia and Australasia) as there is an African Broadbilled Roller *E. glaucurus*, but a better 'more scientific' name, such as Eastern Broadbilled Roller could have been contemplated.
- \* A study of the plates in the Pictorial Guide (PG) of Ali & Ripley (1995) or some other illustrated book on birds,

would reveal quite a few examples of ill-conceived renaming of birds. For example, see Plate 70 of the PG for the three blue coloured magpies, the Redbilled Blue Magpie *Urocissa erythrorhyncha*, Yellowbilled Blue Magpie *U. flavirostris* and the Ceylon Magpie *U. ornata*. The name of Redbilled Blue Magpie *U. erythrorhyncha* is proposed to be changed to Blue Magpie - to shorten the name? The prefix of Redbilled and Yellowbilled for the two species is ideal to differentiate the two similar looking species, both of which are predominantly blue in colour, as discussed earlier.

### Some musings on name changes

- 6 \* The Bluewinged Parakeet *Psittacula columboides* has been proposed to be renamed as Malabar Parakeet, which is partly justifiable as there are three other species in the Indian subcontinent with similarly blue-edged wings (see Plate 50 of PG). The new name is not technically correct, as the species not only occurs along Malabar but almost all through the Western Ghats complex. However, the region Malabar (which means the state of Kerala, or to the locals, a part of Kerala), has probably been the most 'abused' region with regard to Indian ornithology. Many birds with ranges outside this region and even in Sri Lanka, have had the tag of this region's name to their common names! Common name changes become essential in cases like this.
- \* The name of Blackbrowed Treepie *Dendrocitta frontalis* has been changed to Collared Treepie. Both the old and new names seem inappropriate - all the four Indian species have black brows and two have collar-like patterns. Some other name? What about the Black-tailed Treepie - this is one of the two Indian treepies to have a black tail. The other treepie with a black tail is the Andaman Tree Pie *D. bayleyi*, and since the latter is restricted to a region and has a region based name, the renaming of the Blackbrowed Treepie to Black-tailed Treepie would not cause confusion.
- \* The Pied Chat *Oenanthe picata* has been renamed as Variable Wheatear, befitting a species which has various morphs for both males and females.
- \* The renaming of Bartailed Cuckoo-Dove to Barred Cuckoo Dove *Macropygia unchall* is apt, since the bird is barred all over and not only on the tail.
- \* The renaming of the Barred Cuckoo-Shrike *Coracina striata* to Bar-bellied Cuckoo Shrike is apt, as only the belly is barred.
- \* The name Lorikeet, used wrongly for the genus *Loriculus* in the Indian subcontinent, has been changed to Hanging-Parrot, as it is not a true lorikeet.
- \* The Sirkeer Cuckoo *Phaenicophaeus leschenaultii* has rightly been renamed Sirkeer Malkoha, the subgroup to which it belongs.
- \* Blackthroated Jay *Garrulus lanceolatus* has been renamed as Black-headed Jay. A good change, since the species has a black head and the throat is only streaked with black.
- \* Malabar Grey Hornbill *Ocyrceros griseus* is a misnomer as it occurs from Mumbai (Bombay) through Karnataka to Tamil Nadu. Now the Sri Lankan race is regarded as a species, with the name Sri Lanka Grey Hornbill *Ocyrceros gingalensis*.
- \* The Rufous-backed Shrike *Lanius schach* has been renamed the Long-tailed Shrike. The renaming was necessary, as only the extreme lower parts of the back are rufous, not the whole back. The new name is distinguishing, as it has a comparatively longer tail than the other species.
- \* The Indian Treepie *Dendrocitta vagabunda* has been renamed as Rufous Treepie - a good change since there are quite a few other 'Indian Treepies' and the new name suits the species well.
- \* The Himalayan Treepie *D. formosae*, a species also recorded in some pockets of the Eastern Ghats, has been named as the Grey Treepie.
- \* The alternate name of Scarlet Minivet for the Scarlet or Orange Minivet *Pericrocotus flammeus* has been rightly retained, as its colour is scarlet (reddish with a tinge of orange) rather than orange.
- \* Redbrowed Finch *Callacanthus burtoni* has been renamed as Spectacled Finch, which is more appropriate, as the red and yellow 'spectacle' is present in males and females respectively.

- \* Pheasant Grouse *Tetraogallus szechenyii*, which is a partridge and not a grouse, has been appropriately changed to Buff-throated Partridge.
- \* The Pond Heron *Ardeola grayii* has been renamed as the Indian Pond Heron, which was necessary, as there were other Pond-Heron species by the name of Chinese Pond Heron *A. bacchus* and Javan Pond Heron *A. speciosa*.
- \* The absurdity of calling the two sexes of a bird species by two names was done away with, by the renaming of the Ruff and Reeve *Philomachus pugnax* to Ruff. Incidentally this 'new name' was the name used by Jerdon.
- \* Both the Yellow-throated Sparrow *Petronia xanthocollis* and Rock Sparrow *P. petronia* have yellow throats, so the name of the former has been changed to Chestnut-shouldered Petronia. But, why hasn't the name of the latter been changed to Rock Petronia, the group to which it belongs, as the former?

### Suggestions offered for renaming

- \* A species should not have the same name as another species in any part of the world. In addition, a species should not have different names in different countries. In such cases, the name more commonly accepted in most areas could be accepted. However, it is suggested that sometimes the less common name should be selected if it appears more appropriate. In the case of the Woolly-necked Stork versus White-necked Stork, the latter name is more appropriate - the soft wool-like texture of its neck feathers can only be felt (dead birds!), while the white neck is easily seen in the field.
- \* The name should apply well or broadly to all the races of a species. By this, the need to give names to subspecies can be totally eliminated. Many birdwatchers in India question the reason for changing of the Goldenbacked Woodpecker group to Flameback. This is because, there are races of some species of this group which have reddish and not golden backs. Thus, the name Flameback can apply to both the goldenbacked and redbacked races. However, we suggest the addition of the suffix Woodpecker also, i.e., Flameback Woodpecker (see Table 2).
- \* Traditional names, especially those that find a place in everyday life or literature, should not be meddled with, unless unavoidable. For example, two of the larger species of kingfishers of Australia are known as kookaburras. The kookaburras are so well entrenched in Australian lore, literature and song, that changing their names to kingfishers (the family to which they belong) would not be without damage.
- \* Group/family names of birds should accompany each species as far as possible, e.g., Coppersmith to Coppersmith Barbet.
- \* Deletion of existing alternate common names should be carried out. Examples are Black Drongo or King Crow (*Dicrurus adsimilis*), Haircrested or Spangled Drongo (*Dicrurus hottentottus*), Crow-pheasant or Coucal (*Centropus sinensis*), Spotted or Dusky Redshank (*Tringa erythropus*), Cape Pigeon or Cape Petrel (*Daption capense*). In such cases, the more apt name should be retained.
- \* The coining of new names, in most cases, have followed the rules of grammar and syntax, which should be welcomed. After a perusal of the different styles of use/non-use of hyphens, we feel that the following pattern is ideal for the following reasons:
  - a) Hyphens in adjectival cases - White-cheeked Bulbul and not Whitecheeked Bulbul. Use of hyphens in adjectival cases do not really make much of a difference (unless one wants to adhere to proper grammar), but is useful when the same alphabets meet together in two words, e.g., White-eyed Babbler versus Whiteeyed Babbler.
  - b) Hyphens are essential in the case of double-case group names, e.g. Flycatcher-Warbler, Eagle-Owl. Use of hyphens in group names will help ornithologists and birdwatchers know that it is a group name and not just a name used for the species. For example, if hyphens were used for the Tibetan Eared-Pheasant, one would know that the Eared-Pheasant is a group name, otherwise one would not be sure and presume it could also be a descriptive name, as in the case of the Asian Brown Flycatcher (in this case Flycatcher is the group, Brown (or Asian Brown) is the descriptive name for the species.
- \* Assigning place/country names to birds should be avoided, unless they are endemic to a region or largely to that region. ~~And if there are more than one species of a group endemic to a region, then an additional adjective should be added to both the species.~~ For example, a species cannot be named as Andaman Crane

and another Slaty-bellied Crane, if both are endemic to that region. Both should carry the tag of the place, i.e., Andaman \_\_\_\_\_ Crane, with the addition of an adjective in the former case.

- \* The prefix of *Common* has to be used with caution, as it can be regionally biased. At the most, it could be used for a species that has a widespread distribution over countries or continents (e.g. Common Coot *Fulica atra*). It should not be used for a species that is restricted to only a region/country, and having closely allied species in other parts of the world. One example is the Common Grey Hornbill *Ocyrceros birostris*, which has now been renamed Indian Grey Hornbill.
- \* Uniformity and proper logic in renaming is advised. For example, the White-throated Munia (*Lonchura malabarica*) has been renamed as the White-throated Silverbill -why not Munia, as in other species of the genus/group?

To sum up, the exercise on deciding the standard common names of birds of the Indian subcontinent is complex . One has to look at it from a worldwide angle first, know the technical and taxonomic details, and also give some thought to historical and cultural aspects. It can be extremely difficult in the case of families, where there are many similar looking species, either due to their drabness (pipits) or multicoloured with the same color schemes/patterns repeating in many of the species (sunbirds). The decision we at the BNHS (and from discussions with a few other ornithologists )have arrived at (Table 2) is in no way final and we expect to receive a lot of criticism. It is through this feedback that we will be able to reconsider our views, before sending the finalised list of bird names to the IOC - for the birds of the Indian subcontinent, which is a geographical and not political (read: where politics should not find a place) entity. Lastly, it is admitted that there is quite a large lobby against the idea of common name changes, but we hope they will realise the importance of such an exercise as it will only benefit future generations of ornithologists and birdwatchers.
